

Saving Bailieborough's Swifts

Autumn 2023

The Friends of Castle Lake group decided at a committee meeting that it would be a great idea to get involved in a swift conservation project. Being aware of their status as a red listed bird there was great support from the group to take on this project to help ensure that we can halt their decline in the town. Following this contact was made with Lynda Huxley from Swift Conservation Ireland who provided us with help and advice whenever needed.

Spring 2024

To help us get a project going we received a donation of a swift box and caller to fit on a local school from OPW via Lynda Huxley. We then approached the Model Primary School to find out if they might be interested in getting involved in this project as the school building was ideal for swift box placement. Principal Myrtle Griffith and Rev Ian Horner were very interested in supporting this project along with Co Cavan Heritage Officer Ann Marie Ward. There was great excitement when the first swift box went up in early April and to celebrate this we visited the school to tell them all about swifts and the project.



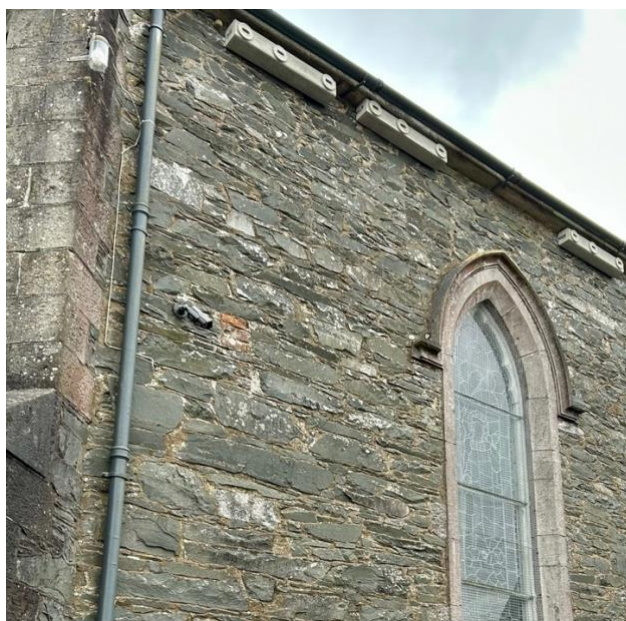
Summer 2024

BirdWatch Ireland East Cavan Swift Survey: We recorded swift activity around town throughout the summer months and met with Annie Birthwistle from BirdWatch Ireland when she visited the town to carry out the survey. The aim was to identify active nest sites on buildings in the town in order to protect them and to determine suitable locations for installing nest boxes to provide additional nesting opportunities. Encouragingly, a small but vulnerable breeding population was discovered in the town. 30 nests were recorded, scattered throughout the town mostly on private buildings. Annie followed up the survey work with a very informative swift presentation at Bailieborough Business Centre in August.



Spring 2025

With funding from Cavan Heritage, the group acquired eight Schwegler swift nest boxes and three caller systems. The boxes and sound systems were installed on three public buildings in Bailieborough. Thanks to Cavan Heritage, BirdWatch Ireland and Lynda Huxley of Swift Conservation Ireland for their help and support with this project.

Summer 2025

Swifts were observed checking out one of the boxes on the Model School. This was the first box put in place in 2024. Screaming parties were observed in the area and we were very pleased to see birds taking an interest in the boxes! We continued to monitor swift activity around town over the summer months.

Heritage Week August 2025

Minister for Nature, Heritage and Biodiversity Christopher O'Sullivan visited Co. Cavan during Heritage Week and took time out of his schedule to visit the Bailieborough Library and meet with members of the Friends of Castle Lake group to hear about our project. As a keen birder himself he took a great interest in the work we were doing in the town to save our swifts. We also hosted a swift awareness event in the library that evening. The plight of our house martins was also highlighted at this event. This event was well-attended and something we plan to continue to do year on year to increase awareness of these special summer visitors.

How to Identify a Swift

They are medium sized, dark brown in colour, bigger than a swallow. They have narrow boomerang shaped wings and a forked tail. They have a fast acrobatic flight and can be seen flying in the sky above over the summer months. Note their dark belly and cigar shaped body, this helps separate them from swallows and house martins who both have pale undersides. Swifts emit a screeching flight call, they fly in screaming parties over their territories on summer evenings. Swifts never perch on wires like swallows and house martins do. All of their toes point forward so that their small feet can cling to vertical surfaces rather than perch.



Friends of Castle Lake Catchment

Friends of Castle Lake Catchment is a voluntary environmental group established in 2022 whose main objectives are to educate, communicate and preserve the natural biodiversity of the Castle Lake Catchment and its wider community. March 2026

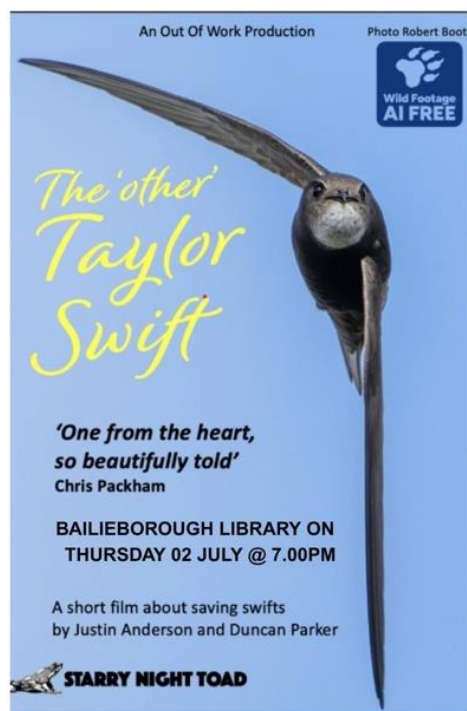

Summer 2026 Update

Birds were noticed entering some of the nesting boxes at dusk at two locations in Bailieborough: Church of Ireland and the Model School. Screaming parties are being regularly observed at these sites. Bangers have been observed checking out the newly fitted Vivara boxes at St Anne's School, Bailieborough. At Killann Church, breeding birds were present at natural nest sites on the building. One of the natural nest sites was taken over this year by starlings but thankfully the birds have discovered the newly fitted Vivara boxes. Bangers have been observed checking out the boxes and on a recent visit two birds were seen entering one of the boxes at dusk.

In total we now have 7 locations with swift boxes in place. This includes a 17A schwegler box and caller donated to Bailieborough Courthouse. Both Groups will continue to monitor the swifts over the summer and to watch out for birds entering and leaving natural nest sites. We understand the importance of recording all active nests and will encourage the local community to get involved in saving swifts.
